



JaxTHRIVE, a local student-led nonprofit, welcomes refugee children to America through tutoring and mentoring. Founded in 2017 as a one-on-one Saturday educational program, the organization transitioned to virtual tutoring via ZOOM in 2020 with the emergence of Covid. Although anxious to get back to in-person tutoring, JaxTHRIVE found that by offering an on-line program it could engage volunteers and refugee students from all over the world.

Believing in the power of collaboration and collective voice, this nonprofit partners with Lutheran Social Services, Kim's Open Door, and other organizations in the refugee resettlement arena to make a difference. Most recently, it announced a new partnership in Miami with the Refugee Assistance Alliance. JaxTHRIVE boasts a current virtual enrollment of 25 students but expects that number to increase as more refugees from Afghanistan are allowed into the country.

I could not do anything in my country because the educational system was such poor quality. I came to the U.S. right before the Taliban took over Afghanistan in 2021. Now, it is so hard for me to watch my friends who have had to deal with the Taliban controlling our beautiful country. People are not safe in Afghanistan, and this is a real problem! America is a great place for me to study. I want to develop my future like other students in the U.S. Although I sometimes do have problems, I can easily solve them in America! I would like to study hard to become a dentist. In American, if I study hard, I can become a dentist which is great! This is my dream! Thank you!

IT WAS AMAZING TO LEARN ABOUT OTHER COUNTRIES

This past year, I had a unique opportunity to coordinate a JaxTHRIVE partnership with OneProsper International, a nonprofit based in Canada that is focused on ending female illiteracy and gender-based poverty in rural India. I set up the east coast OneProsper English Learning Buddy program which is a virtual mentoring program designed to help girls in the Thar Desert area of India to learn English. I managed volunteers from 3 schools and one university. Although the program was paused for five weeks when India shut down to manage their COVID cases, and then again during their country-wide school examinations, it was exciting to have an opportunity to get to know a girl my age living in India. I was paired with Diya, a 16-year-old student who enjoys reading, listening to music and "watching the stars" in her free time. I remember our first Zoom call, how interesting it was that her room was decorated just like an American teenager's room, filled with posters and colorful pictures. An important part of JaxTHRIVE is our JaxTHRIVE Journeys program, which is a community-based interactive lecture series featuring speakers from many of our refugee countries. Each program explores the food, culture, and politics of a particular country. Topics have focused on Syria, the Lost Boys from Sudan and most recently Afghanistan.



We also started a Zoom teen series where we invite students from all over the world to discuss and attempt to solve some of our current global challenges in a safe and open virtual environment. We have discussed a variety of global issues including global warming and our differing experiences with COVID-19 rules and restrictions. Our most recent group included teens from Iraq and across the US who shared insights, opinions, and questions.

Hello everyone, my name is Dar Salam, and I am from Sudan. Of course, everyone knows me, but I wanted to introduce you to my name, which means the “Place of Peace”. My goal is to bring peace everywhere in the world. I attend Atlantic Coast High School and this year I am a senior. This is my final year in high school. I recently graduated high school with the help from a few caring, and loving groups in Jacksonville. These programs are Kim’s Open Door, Lutheran Social Services (LSS), and JaxTHRIVE. When I first came in the United States, I didn’t speak any English, not even A to Z. My sisters and I started summer camp at Kim’s Open Door where they taught us the alphabet letters and basic English. Eventually, I started school. At this time, I also started coming to the LSS after-school program where they help refugee students with their homework using online mentors, and fun activities. Since I was in 9th grade, Mr. Gene (from LSS) has picked me up from school and taken me to work with volunteers who have taught me what to do and what not to do. I even had a mentor one or two days each week over Zoom.

Another program that I loved was the Super Saturday School with JaxTHRIVE that helped Refugee students with English as their second language. They have many volunteers helping students with their homework, reading books, math, science, and fun activities. They also have online mentoring that I used. My mentor’s name was Roberto; he’s an excellent student who helped me with geometry and SAT test. These programs are not the same as a school. What I mean by that, in high school no one will teach you how to read step by step, rather they teach you as whole students; but these programs were on site with me and taught me step by step to learn.

Because of everyone’s help, I was able to get good grades, especially this year. I got all A/B’s and surpassed my SAT test goal which was exciting. Without their help, I wouldn’t have made it. I want to thank each and every one of you for the time you spent teaching me and always being positive with me. These programs are absolutely making a big difference! I am very grateful for all of your help and wish the best to all of these amazing volunteers! Love you and miss you all!
