A NOTE FROM OUR CO-PRESIDENTS

Since we began our Co-Presidency three years ago, we have seen JaxTHRIVE grow into a global organization. We successfully navigated through COVID by adding virtual tutoring which has accelerated our ability to export JaxTHRIVE to multiple cities across the country and the world seven days a week. Our volunteer base has grown from 120 to close to almost 300 teens impacting approximately 225 refugee youth. Creating a Leadership Council two years ago has allowed us to share responsibilities, encourage leadership, and empower other young people to share our mission. Currently we have established JaxTHRIVE clubs in eight different schools and we envision empowering more of our volunteers to establish JaxTHRIVE clubs in their own communities.

We are continually amazed and grateful for the dedication and enthusiasm of our volunteers. Whether it's helping a student with a science, math, spelling, or an English assignment, our virtual tutors are ready to jump in at moment's notice to help. Through our partnership with Kim's Open Door, we have our largest in-person tutoring class of thirty-five students. It's not the average teen that is willing to give up six hours on a Saturday, but our volunteers arrive with smiling faces and warm hugs.

With the situation in Ukraine and Afghanistan, we know there is more work to be done. We've grown alongside the kids and have seen how much this program has improved their lives and the lives of our volunteers. Our students share their dreams and fears. The excitement when students get a good grade on an assignment or bonding over shared interests remind us how important it is to keep this important work going.

We hope to see everyone at our upcoming fundraiser in February!

Our Impact as JaxTHRIVE Mentors Carter Magnano

Throughout my time volunteering with JaxTHRIVE, I have come to realize how much of an impact tutors like myself have on students' lives. When they are around their American peers at their schools, they may see their friends doing or saying inappropriate or rude things to each other. The refugee children, new to Western culture, might view these actions as "normal" for American teens to do or say, and repeat them to appear "cool." As JaxTHRIVE mentors, it is important for us to step in and let our mentees know that those behaviors are not okay. Without this intervention, it will be hard for our students to correct their habits, which could negatively impact them in the future, whether they are trying to get a job or become successful in society. It is experiences like these that make me realize the positive impact that I can have on others' lives.



Reflections of a JaxTHRIVE Tutor

JaxTHRIVE provides us with a wonderful opportunity, in being a place to learn anything. As a tutor at JaxTHRIVE, I have learned some life-changing lessons:

- (1) Nothing is obvious. Cultural differences encourage us to find similarities between us. The beauty of exchanging information is that there is a lesson in every encounter, even for the teacher. My students have taught me valuable lessons, merely by displaying their characters, about resilience, hope, community, tragedy, and even survival.
- (2) Find simplicity in empathy. Difference and variety should encourage a quest for similarities. Empathy is one of the most valuable human traits, that requires the (sometimes difficult) effort of opening our hearts. JaxTHRIVE has brought my empathy forward, as it now lies in the forefront of my mind. It has become a reflex, and life is better for it.
- (3) No two immigrant stories are the same. I quickly learned that my immigrant experience only prepared me to learn about everyone else's. In other words, my experience does not suffice my knowledge of immigration, but it equips me with the tools to learn more.

Ava Cheng: JaxThriving in the Classroom

Ava Cheng ('25) joined JaxTHRIVE in the fifth grade when her older sister started taking her to in-person volunteer sessions. She was instantly inspired. "I thought it was such a unique experience, especially that young, to be able to teach people," Cheng said.

To Cheng, forging friendships with students from other countries is her favorite part of JaxTHRIVE. In light of the COVID-19 pandemic, Cheng has continued to tutor online via Zoom, focusing on English reading and writing for students in a variety of grades.

"English has always been my favorite subject, so getting to share my experience with others is really great," Cheng remarked. "One of my favorite activities is working on crosswords puzzles with kids," Cheng continues.

When asked about her future, Cheng expressed that she wishes to continue tutoring with JaxTHRIVE, even in college. Whether online or in-person, Cheng strives to connect with her tutees, and ensure that they understand what is being taught. "Personally, I'm a visual learner, so providing a visual aspect while teaching is very beneficial," Cheng explained. By using real-world examples or demonstrations, Cheng can ensure that her pupils fully comprehend the lesson, leading to an increased confidence in the classroom.

Whether online or in-person, Cheng's teaching skills - patience and ability to understand the students - has helped students develop the skills and knowledge necessary to succeed.

At first, the change was daunting as I was nervous about hosting online sessions and ensuring our students were engaged, however, with each week, I feel more confident about leading the conversation. Each month we have a new buzzword that we discuss, such as "Inclusion" in November or "Community" in December. During our sessions, we open by talking about our feelings—the highs and lows and emotions we have felt during the week then we define the buzzword, watch a video related to our topic, and discuss the lessons that it teaches. We encourage the students to think about their own experiences and understand how these buzzwords can apply to their daily lives. It is such a pleasure to help our students and watch their interpersonal skills flourish through the semester.



Creating a Welcoming Classroom for Refugee and Immigrant Youth

When I was five years old, I was teased about what I ate because my lunch was different from all the other kids in my class. I didn't feel welcomed because, according to my classmates, the food looked different from "normal." I just wanted friends and to fit in, not to be lonely or left out.

I would also take speech classes to support my pronunciation of words like the ESOL. Kids made fun of my accent, which made me feel even more left out.

I started doing some research and I found out that immigrant youth are more likely to experience bullying victimization than native-born youth. Further, immigrant youth who experience bullying victimization were more likely to report interpersonal, socio-emotional, health and substance use problems. I realized it was not just me and my cousin, so many more kids like us are going through this.

To help other students understand our differences, my parents have done many educational sessions in my classrooms and are very involved in the school. And now, I can help, too. This year, I was selected to join the new American Youth Leadership council. I learned about advocacy, youth organizing, storytelling, and more with immigrant youth from all over the country. I have been learning that youth have so much power to organize and make change and I have decided to make a difference.

Learning is a Two-Way Street at JaxTHRIVE Sanjana Khanna

I have been working with JaxTHRIVE as a volunteer online tutor for the past year, which has changed my life. It is a privilege to share my knowledge with refugee youth, especially being halfway across the continent. Living in Canada has allowed me to tutor children from many different regions within the United States. I am so grateful to interact with individuals who have had such different experiences than I have, including Yosan, the seventh-grade student I have had the pleasure of tutoring about once a week for one year. During this time, I have tutored her in science, math, and English and have learned about her passion for art and her dream to become an artist. She has also educated me on her experiences as a refugee from Ethiopia to her present life adjusting to the United States. In a way, we are tutoring each other, and I continue to be inspired by her. It has been an amazing, impactful year for me, and I look forward to sharing my knowledge with more students.

Volunteer Initiative: Holiday in a Bucket Drive

JaxTHRIVE successfully launched their 3rd annual "Holiday in a Bucket" Initiative where volunteers create customized, homemade gift baskets for all of our refugee families in addition to needy families at the Jewish Family and Community Services. Volunteers decorated and filled holiday-themed buckets with gift items, books, family games, cards, and homemade treats for the families to enjoy together.

While many volunteers helped with this initiative, we were excited to partner again with the USS Detroit Blue Crew who donated 25 overflowing holiday buckets! Realizing that many of the families from Afghanistan were resettled here in Jacksonville because they risked their lives to help our U.S. solders made this project even more special!

JaxTHRIVE Journeys: Ukraine

An integral component of JaxTHRIVE is our JaxTHRIVE Journeys education program. This is a community-based lecture series featuring speakers from many of our refugee countries. Each lecture explores the cultural and political landscape of one of our refugees' homelands. Over the past four years, we have shared programs highlighting Syria, Afghanistan, Iraq, Sudan, and Ukraine.

Most recently, we convened two exciting programs in partnership with GlobalJax that focused on Iraq and Ukraine. Last July, our JaxTHRIVE volunteers spent the afternoon with 15 visiting Iraqi high school student leaders. They discussed how teens spend their free time in Iraq and in the US and identified many common areas related to music, movies, and video games. They shared stories about how they managed life during the COVID pandemic and how they were combating global warming. We were all impressed by their student initiatives to further prevent the impact of global warming in Iraq.

Last October, we partnered with GlobalJax to invite five visiting surgeons from Ukraine to discuss how the war with Russia was impacting life in their country. Each of the physicians shared their own first-hand account of how the war has impacted their family, their medical practice, and their country. Although their photos and videos were hard to watch, their optimism, patriotism and "never give up" attitudes were amazing! We have kept in daily contact with one of the physicians who continues to share photos, videos and stories reflecting the strength and heroism of the people of Ukraine.




In October 2022, the JaxTHRIVE club at The Bolles School hosted Refugee students at the annual Halloween carnival and partook in activities such as pumpkin carving.


